This year's recipients of our Award A Scholarships have outstanding marks and amazing leadership experiences in high school programs and community events.



Thursday Book Group: Death at the Party by Amy Stuart

Amy Stuart is a Toronto born Canadian author, nominated for the Arthur Ellis Best First Novel Award in 2011 for the first of the three Still novels — *Still Mine, Still Water. Still Here. Death at the Party* is her first bestselling stand-alone novel. In a traditional novel structure, there is a focus on personal relationships, protection of those you love, and the impact of time and memory all combined in a classic murder mystery.

The book opens with a woman watching a person die as the sound of a party can be heard in the background. We know who the murderer is but not who is murdered, nor why the murder is happening, nor how it has been done.

The story then shifts to a description of one day – the day of the party: the planned preparations, the flurry of last-minute details, and the introduction of the family and guests, any one of whom may be the victim. As each character is introduced, the reader is lured into wondering if this one is the victim. As details of the lives of Nadine and her mother are revealed, we wonder is this the reason for the murder.

Hints are there, but will you be able to identify them before the author reveals the whole story?

As you read the last chapters, do you think that the murder was justified? Do you find yourself sympathizing with the victim? As we get to know Nadine, we know that she is very methodical even though for this party a little scattered. What do you think is causing her to be "disorganized? Do you think that she missed anything to ensure the success of the party? Has she overlooked something as she commits the murder? Will she get away with the murder?

The only way to find the answers is to read the book and hopefully enjoy it as much as the majority of the readers from the Book Club did.


Linda Schuyler, Our Speaker for the September 25th General Meeting

As a young teacher in east-end Toronto, Linda Schuyler began creating short films with her classes, which led to her first very successful documentaries. This initial foray into film production brought about her founding of the popular television series, **The**



Kids of Degrassi Street, and a television franchise that spanned almost forty years. The Degrassi series launched the careers of many young Canadian actors, as well as addressing difficult issues that young people faced in their lives. In her 2023 memoir, **The Mother of All Degrassi: A Memoir**, Linda relates the inside story of her development of the Degrassi series, and why it was so important to her personally, as well as professionally.

Born in London, England, Linda moved to Paris, Ontario with her parents, Jack and Joyce Bawcutt, who became leaders of the Paris community. Linda attended Paris High School before venturing to the big city for university. Linda has always maintained ties to the local community, and said she is very happy to speak to CFUW Brantford, and meet the members of the club.
